Bishop Mark Edwards OMI - Bishop of Wagga Wagga Diocese

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Thank you for the welcome you have given me as I have moved around the diocese. It has been deeply moving to learn how much you and your priests have been praying for me.

I have been the bishop of Wagga Wagga for almost four weeks. As only very few people could be at the Liturgical Reception, I arrived early in the diocese with the intention of visiting every parish before that event. I apologise to those parishes where I had to cancel visits due to my COVID-19 test and the need to isolate while awaiting the result.

I have now been to all but three of our parishes, albeit only briefly in some. I will get to the parishes I missed as soon as my diary and COVID restrictions allow. My plan is to say Mass in the Cathedral on the last weekend of each month and to visit other parishes and their schools on the other weeks. I intend to visit all the parish Sunday Mass communities in the diocese and their schools before this time next year and will prioritise those parishes that I haven't been to yet.

The day before the Liturgical Reception, thirty priests gathered for prayer and lunch. Mgr Doug George led us in the prayer and in a homily put my service and Profession of Faith and Oath of Fidelity into context. Those priests present - priests from the Border Bubble were not able to attend because of a Government request - renewed the promises they originally made on the day of their ordination and did so with earnestness. Jesus and our spiritual care for you is at the heart of our presbyterate. His friendship makes sense of our lives and service. I thank all our priests for their commitment to friendship with Jesus, to the Church and our diocese. On your behalf, I thank them for their care for you and, on a personal level, I am deeply grateful for the support and priestly friendship they have offered me. I plan to meet individually

with all of our priests over the next year to hear their stories and to listen to what is in their hearts.


It is my hope that I slip into the life of the diocese rather than making a splash. It is my intention to spend the first year listening and learning. While I will make urgent decisions and day-to-day decisions, I will leave as many important decisions as possible for some time.

I don't come with a vision for the diocese. While I have ideas that I am excited about, I am aware that I don't know you or the clergy and that my ideas could be of little value or even counterproductive. My vision will develop from what I learn from you and others in the diocese, from my visits to parishes and their schools, from the Plenary Council and from my history as formator, educator and auxiliary bishop.

The Plenary Council process has my confidence. While there are pressure groups pushing their agendas, the closer I get to the heart of the process, the more I experience that the people there are trying to listen to what the Spirit is saying and I believe that God's Will is being discerned. Learning how we are called to be a Christcentred Church that is missionary and evangelising, that is humble, healing and merciful, that is inclusive, participatory and synodal, that is a joyful, hope-filled and servant community, that is prayerful and eucharistic, and that is open to conversion, renewal and reform must be a helpful and good thing. Even these topic headings that came out of discerning the data from the listening and dialogue sessions fills me with hope and energy. The agenda for the Plenary Council will also include governance issues from the report that the bishops commissioned which is entitled Light of the Southern Cross. This report will be made public later this year. I am excited that we are able to be a part of this process and its timing at the start of my time with you in the diocese is a gift from

Wagga priest Paddy Sykes celebrates first wedding since **COVID-19 restrictions introduced**

A Wagga priest has shared his confidence in live-streamed weddings becoming the new norm after celebrating a wedding for the first time since Covid-19 restrictions were introduced.

Father Paddy Sykes celebrated a wedding at Saint Michael's Cathedral, with a total turnout of 25 people.

While the crowd was smaller than they had originally hoped, the amount of people helping celebrate the occasion was anything but small.

"They live streamed the ceremony so their friends and family in Victoria, and those overseas, could watch it all still in real time," she said.

"I only heard positive feedback from everyone involved, and about how much they enjoyed it."

While COVID-19, hopefully, won't last forever, Fr Sykes said he could see the live streaming of weddings becoming commonplace.

"I really think it's going to become standard," he said.

"Take elderly grandparents, for example, who may be in nursing homes and would not ordinarily be able to make it - live streaming means they don't have to wait ages down the track to see photos, they can actually watch it as it happens."

Wedding celebrants' roles in couples' special days have become all the more valued with the limited number of guests allowed to share the experience, and Fr Sykes said he was thrilled to be involved.

"It was a very special day and it was nice to be back in the Cathedral," he said.

The club no one wants to join

Last year Felicity shared with Together the grief of losing her son. June 23rd was the first anniversary of the death of Paul and Felicity de Fombelle's son Etienne. Here, Felicity shares a personal reflection.

I hug the photo of my precious five-year-old son, who died one year ago, as I walk to my grief counselling appointment.

Each week I take a different photo with me. It rests on the front passenger seat of the car as I set off from home.

I dread the sessions but know I need them

I pack some makeup in my handbag too. The appointment goes for more than an hour and afterwards I need to fix up my tear-streaked face before heading to work.

My grieved self cannot enter the office. People can't see me that way.

The sharing with my counsellor is intense and it is a challenge to switch to work mode in the office, but we all wear our masks.

Some are thicker than others.

So I arrive at the Red Nose office for my Friday morning appointment. Formerly SIDS & Kids, the organisation was started in 1977 by bereaved parents to support grieving families and reduce child deaths.

I dread the long walk from the carpark, every step reminding me I am a bereaved mum

I wish there was no such thing. That there was no Red Nose office.

My son Etienne died suddenly on Sunday June 23, 2019. He was having a mid-morning nap on the couch. When I went to wake him he was dead.

A swarm of police, paramedics and doctors invaded our home that long

afternoon and a police officer asked if he could pass my details to Red Nose.

It was one of many questions fired at me that dizzy day. I said Yes, and there began my journey of counselling and healing.

I don't know when, how or if it will

While I feel apprehensive in the days leading to each appointment, I ignore the voice urging me to opt out, feeling I have little choice but to confront head on this beast called grief.

Counselling gives me a safe place to fall apart and vent feelings of rage, resentment, sadness and despair.

And feel protected, because grief strips you bare. Clothed only in vulnerability.

The control you once clung to has gone. The child you once nurtured ripped from you. In its place only pain, a constant pain that is too much for one person.

As my 10 year old son Ericwrote on my birthday card, "Our hearts are broken and we need to put them back together."

My counsellor and I explore difficult

terrain such as:

- My sense of despair and not wanting to go on living, knowing how much my three living sons need me but yearning to be with Etienne,
- Finding the confidence to say I am a mother of four, with three living sons and one in heaven. That takes practice,
- Navigating well-meaning friends who want to support when all I want to do is hide,



- Coping with ordinary events that are now nerve-racking and fill me with dread such as meetings and work, and
- Feeling nothing but pain and nothing beyond.

She assures me that life can and will be better and I have to believe that.

Carving out time to talk about Etienne and the pain of his loss is the right thing to do.

My youngest son comes alive, if only through words, photos and memories. And his Mum, ever so slowly, can heal.

A few months into our sessions, I have a confession for my counsellor.

"I hate coming here," I blurt out.

"It's the club no one wants to join."

I am a member of the Bereaved Parents Club and she is with me for the journey.

God is doing his share of heavy lifting too, but that's another story.



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A Checklist for Catholic Dads

Father's Day will be celebrated on Sunday 6th September. This article talks about living up to 7 expectations that will help Catholic men with their responsibility to be strong fathers and husbands as well as humble followers of Christ.

I have had numerous conversations over the years with other Catholic dads about the challenges of raising kids in today's world.

The discussions usually center on the bad cultural influences affecting our children, our hectic schedules, and our well-intentioned desire to be better fathers.

We mean well, but how do we move from conversation to action? The stakes are high, and this generation of children desperately needs fathers to step up to their responsibilities.

I was blessed to grow up with great parents. We didn't have much, but my parents made sure my sister and I had love, discipline, faith, strong values, and a solid work ethic. My mother played a vital role in our family, as all mothers do, but I find as I grow older that I am most like my father.

I pass on to my own children many of the lessons he taught me, and I still look to him for wisdom and advice.

Look back on your own upbringing. What role did your father play? Were there other role models? Just as many of us live out the lessons we learned in our youth, our children will someday emulate us. They are always watching, and we have to decide if we will be their heroic role models who consistently set the right example or relinquish our fatherly responsibilities to a host of bad societal influences. Which will it be?

After recently reflecting on my conversations with other dads, I made a list of the actions I am working on which I learned from my father and my own experiences as a parent. Just making this list was convicting and challenging for me, as I became acutely aware of where I fall short. Yet developing this list has also inspired me, and I try to reflect on these actions during my prayer time each day.

I have a long way to go, but I believe living up to the expectations below will keep me headed in the right direction:

Surrender. We have to surrender on an ongoing basis to Christ for his will to be done in our lives. Guys, we are not in charge ... as much as we want to be! St. Ignatius of Loyola once said: "Few souls understand what God would accomplish in them if they were to abandon themselves unreservedly to him and if they were to allow his grace to mold them accordingly."

Be a Man of Prayer. Our children will be much more likely to pray if we do. Work on developing a daily prayer routine with the goal of at least an hour a day devoted to prayer. Sound difficult? Think about how much TV we watch a day or time spent answering email. Consider how much time we spend in our cars each day and how much time we devote to exercise. We have more than enough time for prayer if we schedule it and integrate it into our day. Also, imagine the powerful influence we can have on our children if they see us on our knees in prayer each night at family prayer time.

Understand Our True Vocation. For those of us blessed to be married and have children, we must recognize that helping our families get to heaven and being good husbands and fathersnot our business careers—is our real vocation. Ask yourself: "Is my work serving my family? Or is my family serving my work?"

Invest Time. Our children need our time. Put down the smartphone; turn off the TV; cancel the golf outing. Let's spend more time with our kids! In the absence of a father's time with his family, you can bet there are countless bad influences ready to take his place and guide his children in the wrong direction. I paraphrase authortheologian Scott Hahn, who wrote that in our modern age the father or mother who is willing to walk out of the office after forty hours in order to have more time with his/her family is the real hero.

Be Courageous. Christians are meant to stand out, not blend in. Blending in speaks to conforming so that our faith becomes part of the mainstream ... and we need to fight the culture. These are difficult times, and we have a responsibility to love and defend Christ, be great role models for our families and stand up for our faith.

Practice Detachment. Are we too focused on acquiring toys, bigger houses, nicer cars, or the next promotion? We need to let go of the things that are in the way of our prayer lives, Mass attendance, charitable giving, volunteering, time with our families, and certainly our relationship with Christ.

Love Our Wives. Husbands, we must love and cherish our wives, plain and simple. Our children will learn to love others by how they see Mom and Dad love each other. We need to say, "I love you" to our wives and our children as often as possible. Let's show our wives respect and cherish the critical role they play in our families. "The most important thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother." So said Theodore Hesburgh.


Today's kids face significant challenges and strong fathers, without a doubt, are part of the solution.

Let's take a few minutes to reflect on how we are doing as fathers and a husbands. Take the results of this reflection to prayer and reconciliation. Most importantly, commit to make the necessary changes.

As Catholic men, we have a responsibility to be strong fathers and husbands, leaders in our parishes, good stewards in our communities and humble followers of Christ.

Let's look to the inspiring example of St. Joseph, patron saint of fathers, workers and the universal Church, for his obedience, humility, selflessness, courage, and the love he showed to Mary and Jesus.

If we can emulate St. Joseph even a little each day, we will be that much closer to becoming the men and fathers we are called to be.



ACN Australia launches National Emergency Appeal for Lebanon

The Australian office of the international Catholic charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) has launched a national emergency appeal for Lebanon, requesting prayers for victims and their families, and raising funds in the wake of the deadly explosion in Beirut on the 4th of August, which has killed at least 135 people, injured 5000 and decimated the capital city.

The funds that are raised will be used to support the most urgent needs in Lebanon (such as emergency food packages) but they will also respond to the physical and spiritual needs that arise in the coming weeks, months and years.

ACN is grateful that the appeal has been given the endorsement and support of Bishop Antoine-Charbel Tarabay of the Maronite Catholic Diocese of Australia and Bishop Robert Rabbat of the Melkite Catholic Eparchy of Australia and New Zealand.

In launching the appeal, the National Director of ACN Australia, Mr Bernard Toutounji, is asking the Catholic people - and all people of goodwill - to offer a prayer and a donation for the Lebanese people. "Australians love the Lebanese people, who have been an integral

part of this nation since the 19th century; indeed almost 250,000 Australians claim some Lebanese ancestry. Lebanese Australians have, and continue to, contribute significantly to our civic, religious and business fabric. The explosion in Beirut has devastated the lives of our Lebanese brothers and sisters, and we feel their pain today. I appeal to the Catholic and wider community to support the people of Lebanon with their prayers and financial resources. The sort of carnage we have witnessed cannot be fixed overnight, this will take years, and even though all of us are currently living through the stress of the coronavirus pandemic, we must put ourselves in solidarity with Lebanon and her sons and daughters."

Bishop Tarabay, the spiritual leader of 160,000 Maronites in Australia, expressed his gratitude for the appeal. ! lives of all those who have been



"I give my blessing to this national appeal. ACN has been on the ground in Lebanon for many, many years working with the priests, religious and the people to keep the faith alive. Our people have suffered so much for so long, but I know Australians will be carrying them in their prayers and I thank them for anything they can do to help us."

Bishop Rabbat leads the 50,000 Melkite Catholics of Australia, many of whom are themselves Lebanese. "This is a shocking situation, this is the land of my own birth, and I mourn with the people of Lebanon. I am conscious though that in this month we will commemorate the Dormition (Assumption) of the Mother of God, so we must pray that the Theotokos will bring hope and healing in the



affected. For those who have died, memory eternal! I thank everyone for supporting this appeal."

Christians in Lebanon can

count on help from ACN

The international Catholic pastoral charity and pontifical foundation Aid to the Church in Need (ACN International) has been working for decades with numerous different project partners within Lebanon – above all in the areas of pastoral care and help for refugees.

This has proved to be a great advantage in the aftermath of the recent catastrophic explosion in the port of Beirut. ACN has immediately sent 410,000 AUD in emergency aid to starving Christian families, many of whom are facing real hunger. There is a great deal more still to be done. For example, the Christian quarter of Beirut has been extensively damaged. Tobias Lehner has spoken to Regina Lynch,

What news do you hear from the project partners in Beirut? What is the situation in the city?

Beirut is in a state of crisis. There is hardly any electricity and in some places no means of communication (telephone, Internet etc.). Some 90,000 homes and houses have been destroyed or damaged. The

international aid of AUD 488 million promised on Sunday falls far short of what is needed to rebuild the district affected by the explosion.

What is the local Church doing to help those who have survived the disaster?

Already before the explosion, the Catholic Patriarchates (Maronite, Greek-Catholic, Syriac-Catholic, Armenian) in Lebanon had got together with local parishes and institutions such as Caritas, St. Vincent de Paul and the Pontifical Mission Societies, and created a committee to see how to help the Christians who were already facing soaring inflation, coupled with spiraling unemployment. Many families were on the brink of starvation and Christians were already talking of leaving the country.

Since an aid distribution plan had already been set up, this now means that the Church is in a good position

for distributing the aid that is being provided by foreign NGOs, e.g. food, medicine, blankets. It is inspiring to see the role that the Catholic young people are playing in helping with the distribution of the emergency aid.

For what purpose will the aid from ACN be used?

The initial aid of AUD 410,000 from ACN will be used for supplying food packages to 5,000 families, most of whom were affected by the explosion, but also for those Lebanese and refugee Christians, who were already struggling to survive before the explosion. Some of Lebanon's main grain silos were destroyed in the explosion, resulting in even higher food prices.

What other relief efforts is ACN planning?

Some 80% of the Christian district of Achrafieh has been among the areas worst affected by the explosion – the lower part of it nearest to the

port has disappeared. Hundreds of Christian families have lost their homes and livelihoods. Numerous Catholic hospitals and dispensaries are in urgent need of repair, so that they can continue to function. Countless Church structures have been destroyed or badly damaged, e.g. St. George's Maronite Cathedral, several parish churches, the Middle East provincial houses of various congregations, convents. Aid to the Church in Need is working with our local Church partners to see which of these needs can be addressed immediately and which subsequently, in the next few months before winter sets in.

Christians in Lebanon may be sure that they can count on the prayers and financial support of ACN's benefactors.



St John Baptist Vianney was born in France in 1786. After being drafted into the Army, he deserted and returned home and entered the seminary in 1813.

He was assigned to Ecully and in 1818 he became Cure, as pastor of Ars. He worked 16 to 18 hours a day working in the confessional, administering the Sacrament of Penance, or Reconciliation.





Father's Day: Ice block stick keys and coins box

This simple ice block stick craft is a great idea for Father's Day. Little kids will get a big sense of achievement from making Dad this box to keep his coins and keys in.

You'll need:

- approximately 50 coloured ice block sticks
- glue and paint



How to make:

- Paint the sticks and allow to dry or you can buy them already coloured.
- Start by laying 11 sticks, side by side.
- Put a row of glue across the top edge and stick another single ice block stick along the top edge of these to form a cross frame. Do this along the bottom as well.
- Now layer up the sides of the box the same way: placing a stick along each edge alternately to make a pattern.
- Keep going until you have about six or seven layers up.
- Perfect for keys and coins!





"Be who you are meant to be and you will set the whole world on fire": this is a common paraphrase of the words of St Catherine of Siena. It's tempting to think of your vocation as something you do.

GOD KNOWS US BEST

"Which of us knows what will make us happy?" asks Fr Jacques Philippe in The Way of Trust and Love. We have all had that experience of getting exactly what we thought we wanted, only to find ourselves still unsatisfied. But God knows us better than we know ourselves;





VOCATION IS DIFFERENT

When we speak of Christian vocations, we don't mean a job or a career. Your vocation is the way God invites you to love and give yourself to others.



EVERY VOCATION IS A CALL TO LOVE

On the surface the vocations of priesthood, religious life, married life, and single life seem quite different, don't they? Although there is a beautiful diversity among these vocations, at their heart each shares a common commitment to love.

GOD RESPECTS YOUR FREEDOM

God created us with the "dignity of a person who can initiate and control his own actions"; we have the freedom to choose and be responsible. (CCC 1730). God does not want to force you to choose a certain path, but to listen to His invitation and respond freely, and so "God does not shout but whispers"

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Caritas Australia provides support for Beirut following devastating explosion

Caritas Australia has today provided an initial \$50,000 in crucial emergency relief as part of its Middle East Regional Appeal.

"Today Lebanon is reeling from the effects of the explosion in Beirut on Tuesday. Caritas Lebanon is already on the ground working to assist the most vulnerable - a huge undertaking with the sheer scale of people impacted. The most urgent needs are food, health and shelter", said Kirsty Robertson, Caritas Australia's CEO.

Hygiene kits, already essential to combat COVID-19, are even more needed to protect people from the

toxicity dispersed into air from the 2,750 tons of ammonium nitrate. Medications are needed with many supplies and hospitals directly impacted in the blast, coupled with the high number of injuries experienced. Material for clean-up and renovation is critical.

"The situation is dire. Caritas Lebanon has told us that hundreds of thousands of families were affected, many of whom have slept in shattered homes and in the streets during a deadly pandemic.

The economy is in free fall and parts of Beirut are uninhabitable", Ms Robertson said

"Through its in-country staff and partners in Lebanon, the wider Caritas network is working to deliver emergency food and water, hygiene kits including masks and soap, material for shelter repairs and the clean-up of debris and medication and other health services", she said.

Caritas Australia continues to monitor

the situation and is in regular contact with partners on the ground in Beirut.

According to Ms Robertson, "We pray for the people of Beirut, wider Lebanon and the Lebanese community here in Australia at this time of enormous heartbreak and loss".



COVID-19 Diocesan Protocols

1. Covid-Safe Business

All Parishes must comply with the NSW Government requirement to complete a Covid-Safe Plan and register as a Covid-Safe Business.

2. Maximum Attendance

Places of worship are limited to 100 people, subject to the one person per four square metre rule (excluding clergy and liturgical ministers).

3. Hygiene practices

- a. Sanitisation of hands before entering the church, hall, prayer room, etc.
- b. Wiping down of pews and common areas at conclusion of Mass or gathering.
- c. Priest and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to purify hands with sanitiser before and after offering Holy Communion.
- d. Limit the use of communal books. Ensure they are cleansed between

4. Register of people upon entering the church, hall, prayer room, etc.

- a. Name, phone number and/or email to be recorded
- b. To be kept in a safe place (respecting privacy laws) for at least 28 days.
- c. Funeral directors to keep attendance register for funerals.

5. Eucharist

a. Holy Communion in the hand only.

6-10 Edward St, Wagga Wagga

Effective Friday 24 July 2020

- b. Sacred Host to be offered only, not the Precious Blood.
- c. No touching at the sign of peace.
- d. No offertory procession.
- e. No congregational singing.
- f. No collection plates are to be used, but money/envelopes placed at collection points.

6. Communion to Sick and Elderly **Persons**

Normal pastoral practice continues including Communion to sick persons in hospitals, aged care homes and private homes.

7. Anointing of the Sick

Normal Pastoral Practice continues.

- a. Anointing of the sick in hospitals, aged care homes and private homes if permitted to enter.
- b. If the person has COVID-19, please consult the Bishop's Office.

8. First Penance & First Holy Communion

Normal Pastoral Practice continues, respecting liturgical and pastoral protocols.

9. Confirmation

The sacrament of Confirmation in the Diocese of Wagga Wagga is to be delayed until term 4. If all is clear at that time, Parish Priests will have delegated authority for Confirmations for this year.

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Family reflections for: August

9th August - Nineteenth Sunday in **Ordinary Time, Cycle A**

The mission of the Church is to continue the work **of Jesus.** The family, the domestic church, participates in this mission too.

Talk about how your family participates in the mission of the Church. Discuss ways in which you seek to reach out to your neighbors and people in need through acts of kindness, mercy, and justice. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 14:22-33. Talk about how Peter wanted to be like Jesus, to walk on water like Jesus did. Note that Peter was successful for a time, but then he doubted Jesus, and he began to sink into the water. Talk about how your family's acts of mercy and justice are rooted in your faith in Jesus. Pray together that Jesus will continue to work through your family to prepare the kingdom of heaven. Pray together the Morning Offering or the Lord's

> 1 Kings 19:9a,11-13a Psalm 85:9-14 Romans 9:1-5 Matthew 14:22-33 16th August - Twentieth Sunday in **Ordinary Time, Cycle A**

Even when spurned by Jesus, the faith of the Canaanite woman makes her bold enough to argue and ask again for what she needs. Her persistence and great confidence that Jesus could heal her daughter reminds us of the confidence with which our children bring to us their own needs. In their faith and trust we can find modern examples of how we might approach God in prayer.

As a family recall some times when a request for something was presented by one family member to another with confidence and persistence. If the request was denied, talk about why that was so. If the request was eventually granted, talk about what led to the change of heart. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 15:21-28. Was anyone surprised by Jesus' response to the Canaanite woman? Why or why not? What makes Jesus change his mind and heal the woman's daughter? When we pray, God wants us to be as confident in his mercy. Invite family members to identify the things that they most need from God. Pray these prayers of petition together as a family, confident that God will hear and answer your prayers.

Today's Gospel reminds us that the Church is built on the foundation of faith in Jesus Christ. Peter announces the core of our faith, that Jesus is God's only Son. The family, as the domestic church, has this same faith as its foundation.

As you gather together as a family, talk about people whose faith has helped you to be a member of the Church and talk about what you have learned from leaders in our Church today. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 16:13-20. Talk about what you know about Peter and his importance to the early Christian community. Talk about what we can learn from Peter and

his profession of faith about Jesus. Conclude in prayer together by praying today's Psalm or an Act of Faith. Isaiah 22:19-23 Psalm 138:1-3,6,8

Romans 11:33-36 Matthew 16:13-20 30th August - Twenty-Second Sunday in

Ordinary Time, Cycle A

Peter was expecting a Messiah that would carry out a different plan than the one Jesus had **explained.** Jesus was indeed the Messiah, but his life and death would show a different understanding of what it means to be the Messiah. We too have expectations of God and our own ideas about what we think God ought to be doing in our world. Like Peter we may risk limiting our image of God by thinking only in human ways. God's plan is always more than we can ever imagine.

As you gather as a family, talk about what we expect God to be doing in our world and in our family life. Then read today's Gospel, Matthew 16:21-27. Why do you think Peter was so upset by what Jesus was saying? Notice how Jesus reprimands Peter. Do we sometimes forget to let God be God for us? That is, do we sometimes get discouraged because God doesn't act in our world in the ways that we expect? Pray together that your family will remember that God is always working for the world's salvation in ways that are beyond our human imaginings. Conclude by praying together today's Psalm, Psalm 63.

Mater Dei Catholic College (MDCC) makes mission real

From Amelia Bright, Leader of Mission, MDCC:

Each of our year groups enjoys opportunities to learn about the work of Catholic Mission, through exploration into the charitable and service dimensions of the Catholic Church in Australia. At Mater Dei we embrace the opportunity to develop students' Christian worldview in a holistic sense. Student formation is embedded into the Religious Education curriculum, as well as being shaped into Homegroup learning experiences, charitable fundraising and daily prayer.

In Year 8, Mater Dei students undertake a unit called 'The Church Spreads the Good News'. Throughout the learning cycle, they examine the challenges and opportunities for spreading the Gospel in today's world through active service to the spiritually and materially poor. Students undertake an inquiry learning task, where they investigate the work of Catholic Mission, along with other organisations who are sharing the good news and prepare a Newspaper Article to communicate their findings.

In Homegroups, staff and students collectively learn about the individual encounters and programs facilitated by Catholic Mission. Through this lens, they develop a deeper understanding of Catholic Social Teaching in relation to; stewardship, community and the common good, solidarity, option for the poor and vulnerable, human dignity and the promotion of peace.

The five House groups: Kennedy, Webber, Rosarie, Carroll and Sherrin,

drive the charitable fundraising through activities which include activities, such as, mufti days, cake stalls, karaoke, game show trivia, faux fashions and colour themes as a few of these.

In preparation for upcoming House Days, our students view videos created by Catholic Mission and listen to the positive messages of global and regional change, enabled by fundraising efforts. In preparation for Webber Day, students learnt about the work of Sister Louise and the Good Shepherd Sisters in Bangkok, who are dedicating their efforts to supporting families in need with protective masks and critical supplies during this difficult time of COVID-19. This learning is coupled with a prayer focus, providing a valuable reminder of our call to the mission of the Church, enacted through House fundraising days.

For the joy of the Lord is your strength

At just 16 years old, Chen's life changed in a moment when he stood on a landmine that took both of his legs.

With his family already struggling to make ends meet, they were unsure if they would be able to provide the necessary care for Chen.

With his family already struggling to make ends meet, they were unsure if they would be able to provide the necessary care for Chen. Thankfully, Bishop Enrique Figaredo Alvargonzalez, known to most as Bishop Kike, offered a lifeline, which has opened up many doors for Chen. The Arrupe Centre, established by Bishop Kike in northwestern Cambodia in 2001, has been a home for many people, especially children, with disability – helping to empower them and offer opportunities they might otherwise not have.

The impact of the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975 to 1979, and the nearly twenty years of civil war that followed, is still felt today. Buried, unexploded landmines still cause accidents across the country today. Distressingly, although many organisations are working to clear these landmines, on average, 100 accidents and casualties still occur each year and there is little support provided for these people.

The Arrupe Centre provides children and youth, like Chen, with shelter, food and healthcare, education and career opportunities to help empower them and build their future. The Centre works in conjunction with the Outreach program, another Church-run mission project in Battambang, which provides practical support - such as food, microloans, scholarships to the siblings and repair
