Good things come to those who wait... Liturgical Receptio

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Bishop Mark Edwards OMI - Homily - 22 July 2020

Bishop Mark Edwards OMI gave the following homily at the Liturgical Reception and Solemn Mass held on 22 July 2020 – Feast day of Saint Mary Magdalene.

Mary Magdalene, grief stricken, was looking for the body of Jesus and she comes to the gardener, as she thinks, to ask him for the body.

The first reading puts this in the context of a lover looking for her beloved, searching everywhere. Jesus promises that she who seeks finds and Mary, the seeker, encounters the Risen Christ. It is an experience of deep and tender personal recognition. Mary knows and is known. "Mary" "Rabunni". And the next line after the text of the first reading we are given is the bride holds her groom and won't let him go. She wants to take him to her house, a clinging that Mary echoes in the Gospel. And, as much as Mary wants to meet Jesus, we know in faith that he much more wants true relationship with her. Chiara Lubich must have had some similar encounter: "I would like to bear witness to the whole world that Jesus forsaken has filled every void, illumined all darkness, annulled every pain and wiped out every sin."

How do we have this personal meeting with our Lord which we so deeply desire? Perhaps, sometimes we have to be pushed down onto our knees and almost forced to be open to this encounter. To know our own need and have the hunger of Mary Magdalene that searches and will not let go.

St Theresa of Avila is one of my favourite saints. For many years she was not a bad religious but not a great religious either and she wanted to be more, to be better. One day she came across a new statue of the scourging of our Lord and, moved to her depths, fell on her knees and said to our Lord "I am not leaving until you give

me what I need." And Our Lord was just waiting for this strength of desire; she became within perhaps 8 years a spiritual giant and for her sharing of this journey and experience, she is a doctor of the Church.

One of my friends is praying for me that I have the clarity of she who was the first to recognise the Risen Christ. I pray for me and for you that we also hunger and thirst as she did, a renewed passion for the Lord Jesus.

I think of the many in our world, in our diocese, in our families who are searching and perhaps are mourning. The Gospel promises a fulness. How do we share and preach that fulness in a way that speaks to the hunger of our people for transcendence and fulness? We can have courage as we worship and share our encounter because the Lord has arrived before us and is hard at work.

Mary Magdalene, the apostle to the apostles, be with us as we navigate this mission and cling resolutely to Christ our Master. With you, we pray: "My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God."

Letter of Appointment from Pope Francis

His Excellency Most Rev Adolfo Tito C.
Yllana, Apostolic Nuncio, read the Letter of
Appointment from Pope Francis, in both Latin
and English, at the Liturgical Reception. The
English translation is included below:

Francis, Bishop, Servant of the Servants of God to Our Venerable Brother Mark Stuart Edwards O.M.I., until now titular Bishop of Garba and Auxiliary of the metropolitan archdiocese of Melbourne nominated Bishop of Wagga Wagga, greetings and Our Apostolic Blessing.

God has loved us so much that he

sent his Son for the forgiveness of our sins. We also live to love one another (cf I Jn 4, 1011), and with joy, according to his commandment, rejoicing in the hope of eternity, wherever and whenever we may be. Because with God always near, nothing further need concern us (cf St Augustine, Sermon 171, 1.3).

In reflection, guided by an attitude of

faith and pastoral reason with fatherly love, we have turned Our mind to the spiritual needs of the flock of Wagga Wagga Diocese which is now vacant after the resignation of Our Venerable Brother Gerard Joseph Hanna as we discern the provision of a new Pastor and moderator of diocesan life.

We have considered, Venerable

Brother, your clear spiritual and human gifts as auxiliary Bishop, together with your skill in your work, which have shown us your suitability to fulfil greater responsibilities.

Therefore, having received the advice of the Congregation for Bishops, by virtue of the fullness of Our Apostolic Office, releasing you from the bond of leadership of the Titular Church and from the office of Auxiliary, we appoint you Bishop of Wagga Wagga, giving you the appropriate rights and obligations.

You are to inform the clergy and people of this ecclesial community of Our decree. We exhort them to welcome you as a loved father, a teacher to whom they will listen, a respected guardian.

Venerable Brother, feed this ecclesial community with joy, speaking of the Lord God of love, as a Crow prepares food for its young who cry out because they have none (cf Job 38:41). Led by your example may the community grow and become perfect, be united, live in peace (cf 2 Cor 13:11) and learn to become great in the sight of God.

Given at Rome, at St Peter's, on the twentysixth day of May, in the year of Our Lord two thousand and twenty, the eighth of our pontificate.

Bishop Mark Edwards OMI –

Sixth Bishop of Wagga Wagga

The Most Reverend Mark Edwards OMI was received as the sixth Bishop of Wagga Wagga during a Liturgical Reception and Solemn Mass at St Michael's Cathedral, Wagga Wagga on Wednesday 22 July 2020.

The Liturgical Reception was held on the Feast day of St Mary Magdalene with limited numbers in attendance due to current COVID19 restrictions.

The solemn Mass was concelebrated with the archbishops and bishops who were able to travel, priests of the diocese of Wagga Wagga and of other religious congregations.

Arriving at the Cathedral,
Bishop Edwards was greeted by
a traditional Wiradjuri smoking
ceremony and was then welcomed
by the Metropolitan Archbishop,
the Most Reverend Anthony Fisher
who presented him to the Apostolic
Administrator the Most Reverend
Christopher Prowse and his Delegate
Reverend Father Kevin O'Reilly.

Following a Welcome to Country by Wiradjuri Elder, Aunty Kath Withers, Archbishop Fisher welcomed the intimate congregation declaring "Good things come to those who wait. Clearly Pope Francis thinks Bishop Mark Edwards is a very good thing and so you've waited nearly four years for him as well as a COVID19 lockdown to make this, not only one of the most welcome installation ceremonies but also one of the strangest in the


history of the Church in Australia."

The Apostolic Nuncio to Australia, His Excellency Most Reverend Adolfo Tito C. Yllana, read out the Apostolic Letter appointing the Most Reverend Mark Edwards OMI Bishop of Wagga Wagga, first in Latin, then in English.

Archbishop Francis Carroll, Emeritus Archbishop of Canberra and Goulburn, and Third Bishop of Wagga Wagga, handed the Dwyer Crozier to Bishop Mark. Bishop Mark was escorted to the Cathedra (Bishop's Chair) by Archbishop Fisher and Archbishop Prowse, where he took his place as Sixth Bishop of Wagga Wagga.

Amongst those able to attend the Mass were a number of Civic Dignitaries including Deputy Prime Minister and Member for Riverina, Michael McCormack, Member for Wagga Wagga, Dr Joe McGirr PM, Mayor of Wagga Wagga, Greg Conkey OAM, and representatives of other churches, agencies and community groups.

A virtual choir of students from Catholic schools across the diocese performed "Insieme (Together)" via video as representatives of the clergy, religious and laity of the diocese and its agencies, civic and

religious leaders, welcomed the Bishop to his new role as shepherd of the people of Wagga Wagga.

Bishop Edwards thanked the diocese for their patience over the years without a bishop and praised the efforts of Archbishop Prowse in overseeing the diocese.

"I'm grateful to the people and clergy of the diocese who have made me so welcome and who have prayed for a bishop of the diocese," he said.

"To be bishop of this diocese is a call from God through the church." After Communion, the Bishop

thanked his family, friends, brother priests and all those who weren't able to attend today's ceremony.

The Bishop's Coat of Arms features the motto 'Learn who you are in the eyes of God'in both





English and Wiradjuri. This is an appeal from St Eugene de Mazenod, founder of the Oblates to experience that we are beloved children of God and that He delights in us.


Bishop Mark Edwards OMI visits Parishes across the Diocese



Clergy Day Homily

Bishop Mark Edwards OMI met with many of the Priests of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga the day before his Liturgical Reception. The clergy gathering included Praying the Office at St Michael's Cathedral where Monsignor Doug George gave the homily included below.

Some time ago, in fact in the year of Henry Ibe's ordination, I had the good fortune to represent the Diocese of Wagga Wagga at that great occasion. You know that Bishop Hanna was not keen on travel. Even Sydney and Melbourne were too far away for him. So he suggested that I represent him and the Diocese at the Ordination.

And as one does on the way to Nigeria, I visited the German city of Cologne. I was impressed by the Cathedral. Its imposing size set among the buildings of the city. Set on the skyline like a mountain that cannot be hidden The Spires, directing our minds ,our prayer and our whole lives to God. The flying buttresses, giving strength and support to the structure of the building ("and you are that building"), the stone work of the facade which tells the story of the richness of our Faith with its angels and saints and the great mystery of God coming and living amongst us and sending the Holy Spirit to be with us

always.

It also tells of the work of architects and artisans, the people who are continually building the Church of God. And the beauty of God's creation in the materials from which the cathedral was fashioned.

But that façade also tells the story of centuries of wear and tear. In fact the facade was partially obscured be scaffolding needed for the work of restoration. That spoke to me that the beauty of the Church ie., its teaching etc., that has to be taken care of so that it is presented to the people of today in all its freshness.

What also impressed me was a wall in the crypt which contained the names of all the Bishops of Cologne from the establishment of the Diocese in 1288. There have been 94 bishops. I presume some good and some not so good. But men who proclaimed and lived the Word of God, celebrated the mysteries and governed in the name of God.

Tomorrow, will be an historical day as

we write the name of the 6th Bishop of Wagga Wagga into the records. Whether it be the long history of 800 years of Cologne Cathedral or 100 years of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga is the same church established by Christ for His people.

Each diocese has its challenges.
We have our own; they are not insurmountable if we use the talents
God has given us and the grace of God.
We need to invoke the Holy Spirit as our friend and counsellor.


We, as priests, need to do what we promised at our ordination when we placed our hands between those of the ordaining Bishop and said in a loud, clear voice: I promise to obey and respect the bishop and his successors.

The experience of being without a bishop for so long has been trying and rewarding. What a sense of relief and gratitude all felt when the appointment of Bishop Mark was made by the Pope.

The relief and joy has been expressed over and over by the faithful and they have received the visit of the Bishop Elect to each of our parishes as a sign that he has come to be with us and be there for us.

The faithful want to help Bishop Mark in every way and especially by asking the Holy Spirit to guide his episcopate.

I want to finish with the beautiful advice of St. Ignatius of Antioch that we read in the second reading of the office of Readings on Monday. (Monday of 16th week of ordinary time.)

"Everyone should observe the closest conformity with God; you must show every consideration for one another, never letting your attitude to a neighbour be affected by your human feelings, but simply loving each other consistently in the spirit of Jesus Christ. Allow nothing whatever to exist between you that could give rise to any divisions; maintain absolute unity with your bishop and leaders as an example to others and a lesson in the avoidance of corruption."

On behalf of all the priests I welcome you Bishop Mark and, I at least, will pray for you every day.

I also, on behalf of the priests thank Archbishop Christopher Prowse for the time and wisdom given to administration of the Diocese whilst we waited on the Holy Spirit.

And lastly, our thanks to Fr. Kevin O'Reilly for carrying the burden of running the Diocese day to day.

Vale Peg (Margaret) Hanrahan

After the war Peg returned to Corowa and continued her nursing where she met and married Norm Scott. They were the proud parents of two daughters and three sons. Norm passed away when the children were young and Peg became the sole carer and provider of the family.

She was tireless in her commitment to the Red Cross, RSL Auxiliary, Southern Cross Care Karinya, and the Corowa Branch of Catholic Womens League.

For her service to the community Peg received the Citizen of the Year award and was later awarded the Order of Australia Medal. Over the years she served many times as President and Secretary of the Catholic Womens League Corowa Branch, Diocesan Committee and the Melbourne Governing Body for many years. She received her Life Membership in 1991.

At a Mass for the confering of Papal Awards in April 1994 Peg received the "Leonine Cross Pro Ecclesia Et Pontifice". This award recognised Peg for her many years of service and dedication to the chruch through the Catholic Womens League and Pastoral Council of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga.

Peg died on Anzac Day at age 97. Her long and fruitful life was one of service and dedication to others,

She will be remembered always and may she rest in peace.





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

Mother Angelita's 50th anniversary of religious profession

On 6 June 2020, Mother Angelita G. Marave, MACE celebrated her 50th anniversary of religious life.

Just a month after finishing her degree at the University of St Thomas in Manila, and having just turned 20 years of age, she entered the Pastorelle Sisters, an Italian Congregation which her eldest sister had joined earlier. She stayed there until she had her perpetual profession. But God had a different calling for her. She was inspired to form an association of lay people fully devoted to Jesus in the Eucharist and to Mary, Mother of the Church. Eager to promote adoration of Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament and to develop the spiritual life of the members, she started the Missionary Apostles of Christ in the Eucharist (MACE) on 15 August 1987, in Manila, Philippines. This eventually led to the founding of the first MACE Religious Community in Canberra, ACT, on 2 February, 1990, consisting of her as formator, one applicant and a lay associate teenager. She was then the Archdiocesan Coordinator of Catechetics in the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn, with Most Rev. Francis Carroll, as Archbishop. As the years passed by, and with the help of her blood sister, Mother Lydia Marave, the number of religious members increased. Gradually, they were able to open communities in the Philippines, in Australia and in other countries.

The MACE Community obtained their decree of approval as a public association of Christ's Faithful from Most Rev. Gerard Hanna on 18 February 2016, after ten years of presence in the

Wagga Wagga diocese. Their ministry consists of pastoral care of Filipino migrants in some parts of the diocese, and in Griffith, they are pastoral workers, assisting Fr Andrew Grace, parish priest, in various apostolates in the parish such as taking communion to the sick, visiting and assisting families, organizing perpetual adoration and family rosaries, and assisting in pastoral ministry in the hospital and aged care facilities.

Mother Angelita intended to celebrate her 50th anniversary in the Philippines in May 2020, but because of the COVID 19 pandemic, all plans were cancelled. She decided to just have a simple celebration. Because this special event only happens once in a lifetime, the sisters in Australia thought of giving Mother Angel a bigger celebration. They thought of having the festivities in Griffith, where they have a good number of lay associates.

A special thanksgiving Mass, concelebrated by the parish priest and two other priests, highlighted the occasion. Mother Angelita renewed the vows of chastity, poverty and obedience, which she has lived for the last fifty years of her life. Prayers were offered that she may remain faithful to Christ forever.

All the sisters in Australia came together to mark the memorable day, together with their close friends and lay associates. In spite of the visitors being limited in number, there were guests from Sydney, Melbourne, Wagga Wagga, Goulburn, Albury and

The event was successful in terms of the friendly, joyful and fraternal atmosphere that prevailed, and the food was a-plenty, with a combined prevalence of Filipino and Italian food, and highlighted by a whole roasted pig. Thanks to the generosity of their lay associates, benefactors and friends from Griffith.

The agape meal was followed by a

brief program, and everybody was given the chance to express his or her best wishes and greetings to Mother Angelita. All were unanimous in thanking God for the gift of Mother Angelita to the MACE Community, and in saying how she has always been an inspiration to them.

Democratic Republic of the Congo Success Story: Mass Books in the Chiluba language

The Chiluba (Ciluba) language is spoken by around 6 million people in the Kasai Region in the southeast of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. It is one of the four national languages of this huge country in the heart of Africa. Some years ago the bishops of the eight Catholic dioceses within this region recognised the urgent need for new editions of the liturgical books in this language to be gradually introduced. For one thing, the books were already largely worn out; for another they needed to be extensively revised and corrected linguistically.

The Kasai Region is a vast and neglected region, with widespread deep poverty. During 2016 and 2017 there was a series of veritable orgies of violence across the region, during which several thousand people were killed. Dozens of mass graves were subsequently found there. Many church buildings were also attacked, looted and burned down, among them the cathedral and Bishop's residence in Luebo.

The government is to all intents

absent here, and it is left to the Church to take care of all the needs of the people and provide help, to the extent of its possibilities. But man does not live on bread alone, and for the Church it has always been the health of the human soul that is its first concern. The Eucharist is the "source and summit of the life and mission of the Church" as it says in the Vatican II document Lumen Gentium. Hence, for the bishops of the region, the republication of these liturgical books has been a top priority.

Now, thanks to the generous help of our benefactors, ACN was able to provide a subsidy of AUD \$32,500 to enable the first edition of the new Lectionary to be printed. It has been welcomed with great joy, and the bishops, priests and all the Catholic faithful of the eight dioceses of the Kasai Region are profoundly grateful to all our generous benefactors!

Sri Lanka Mass Offerings for 30 Rosarian Fathers

The Rosarians, an Institute of Consecrated Life, are the first contemplative male religious

congregation to be founded in Asia. It was established in 1928 by Father Bastiampillai Anthonipillai Thomas, who was born in a village near Jaffna, Sri Lanka. The congregation also has a female branch, since 1950.

Today, the male branch of the Rosarians has 25 monasteries, above all in Sri Lanka and India. Since this is a poor, native congregation it lacks the resources of an international religious family and consequently ACN has regularly supported the Institute, both in Sri Lanka and in India, with a range of different projects, including as in this case with Mass stipends and help for the formation of its novices.

As a result of the coronavirus pandemic this help is needed more than ever. In Sri Lanka too a lockdown has been imposed since the middle of March. Public religious worship has been forbidden. Father Anil, of the monastery in Kochchikade, tells us what he and his confreres have experienced in the last few months. This is a densely populated region and among those worst affected in the country by the Covid-19 outbreak. "Within our convent we have been able to maintain our regular prayer times, Eucharistic Adoration and the celebration of Holy Mass. We have prayed and made sacrifices for the people. I have the feeling that we have been permitted to experience many blessings during this time."

He continues, "At present we have no income, but we rejoice to share what little we have with our neighbours and with the poor."

During the lockdown, the Rosarians have continued to visit the poor and, while observing the required safety precautions, brought Holy Communion those who requested it, prayed for them and also brought them

material help. "We shared with them whatever generous people had brought and helped everyone who requested our help. And we are continuing to help them as much as we can."

We are proposing to pass on to the 30 Rosarian priests of the congregation in Sri Lanka your kind Mass Offerings, to a total value of AUD \$31,600. These Masses will be celebrated for the intentions of the benefactors who have given them, and at the same time your offerings will be a vital contribution not only to their own support, but also to the works of charity to which they are devoted.

India Support for the life and ministry of 63 Religious sisters in Rourkela

In the diocese of Rourkela, in the north of the Indian state of Odisha (formerly Orissa) there are 63 sisters of the congregation of the Daughters of the Cross. Normally, most of them work in the schools or parishes of the diocese. However, during the coronavirus pandemic they are now all occupied in helping those who are suffering most from the situation. They care for the sick, the elderly and handicapped and in particular they are supporting the migrant labourers, who have suddenly found themselves with no work and nothing to live on. Meanwhile, India is now in fourth highest place in the world in terms of the number of Covid-19 infections. And at the same time many millions of the poorest people, above all the migrant workers and day labourers, have lost their sole source of income.

The sisters are doing all they can to help. They write, "We cannot save the whole world, but at least we can help those people here among whom we live and work." Some of the sisters

are sowing hundreds of metres of material into protective face masks, which they are then handing out to the needy. But the material is not cheap, and they also need disinfectants and gloves in order to prevent the spread of the virus as far as possible.

But since the schools are also closed on account of the pandemic, those sisters who were working as teachers have received no pay for months now. And yet their salaries are the principal source of income for their congregation. ACN is proposing to help with AUD \$16,200.

Bolivia Support for 27 religious sisters in Oruro, in the Andes

High up in the Andes, at an altitude of around 13,000 feet (4000 m) above sea level, lies the diocese of Oruro. Covering an area of nearly 21,000 square miles (53,600 km²) it is larger than some of the smaller European countries, such as the Netherlands for example. Yet it is sparsely populated, with just around half a million people, at least half of whom live in the town of Oruro itself.

The 43 parishes of the diocese, needless to say, cover vast and often inaccessible regions. Consequently, the work of the religious sisters in ministering to the Catholic faithful is of the greatest importance, engaged as they are in proclaiming the faith, catechesis, the youth apostolate and spiritual accompaniment of the people. Not only this, but at the same time they are often the only ones who are helping the people in their concrete, day-to-day needs. Especially in the area of healthcare and education, these religious sisters make a huge contribution. And in addition they run soup kitchens for the poor and other similar establishments.

The cold, the rigours of the high altitude, the difficult and often dangerous roads and the deserted landscape, and the difficult social environment – all this is hard to endure. But the sisters know well that their help and support are urgently needed. And so they continue their work, for the sheer love of God –

since they receive no payment of any

Bishop Krzysztof Bialasik cannot speak too highly of the wonderful work the sisters are doing in his diocese. But since his diocese is also very poor, he has asked us for help for the support of 27 religious sisters belonging to 9 different congregations. We have promised him AUD \$23,900.



Consider The Crows launched

In general terms, this book is a chronicle of the six bishops who have served the Catholic Diocese of Wagga. Each chapter sums up a view of the contributions of the individual bishop to the Diocese.

In 2017, the Catholic Diocese of Wagga Wagga celebrated its centenary – a major event in the church and the catalyst for a book on the history of the diocese.

This book, Consider the Crows, Centenary of the Catholic Diocese Wagga, by Father Justin Darlow, has now been published by Triple D Books, Wagga Wagga, and provides a valuable documentation of the diocese and its spiritual and historical leaders, plus milestones in its growth over the past century.

As the Emeritus Archbishop of Canberra-Goulburn and Emeritus Bishop of Wagga, the Reverend Francis Carroll, notes in the foreword it is "a long-awaited story, providing an understanding of the church's identity, strength and vitality."

Author, Father Justin Darlow, carried out detailed research, drawing on summaries and photographs of the parishes of the diocese to base his work on strong primary source material. He suggests *Consider the Crows* may be of relevance to a readership beyond the church such as students and

others generally interested in history.

The book's style gives the reader chapters on each of the five bishops who have served the Catholic Diocese of Wagga through its first century and foreshadows a second volume with a focus on the diocese's 32 parishes. At the same time, it includes milestones such as the building of St Michael's Cathedral through to the founding of the Vianney College seminary.

While it is of particular interest to the clergy and parishioners of the diocese as well as students, the book's approach and writing style would appeal to a wider audience.



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Upholding community dignity together in Cambodia

Caritas Australia and its partners are carrying out health promotion activities in 130 villages and 19 health centres in four provinces in Cambodia.

They are principally focused on raising health awareness, distributing hygiene products and delivering WASH programs.

In Pursat province, local villagers and committees have collectively distributed banners and posters, and circulated critical information to communities on COVID-19 by loudspeaker. Targeted and timely education measures about COVID-19 transmission and prevention is helping stop the spread of the infectious disease and negative impacts on livelihoods of the poorest, most vulnerable and marginalised people.

Preferential care for vulnerable women, children, the elderly and people with disabilities has been provided to promote good hygiene practice at home. This exceptional support is empowering communities to manage their well-being and uphold their dignity when access to health resources is traditionally very limited.

Caritas Australia and its partners have resourced health centres, commune officers and schools with a range of medical supplies including face masks, gloves, soap, hand washing facilities and water tanks. Approximately 8,000 community people have been supplied soap for hand washing and 600 with access to hand washing facilities.



COVID-19 Diocesan Effective Protocols

1. Covid-Safe Business

All Parishes must comply with the NSW Government requirement to complete a Covid-Safe Plan and register as a Covid-Safe Business.

2. Maximum Attendance

Places of worship are limited to 100 people, subject to the one person per four square metre rule (excluding clergy and liturgical ministers).

3. Hygiene practices

- a. Sanitisation of hands before entering the church, hall, prayer room, etc.
- b. Wiping down of pews and common areas at conclusion of Mass or gathering.
- c. Priest and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to purify hands with sanitiser before and after offering Holy Communion.
- d. Limit the use of communal books. Ensure they are cleansed between

4. Register of people upon entering the church, hall, prayer room, etc.

- a. Name, phone number and/or email to be recorded
- b. To be kept in a safe place (respecting privacy laws) for at least 28 days.
- c. Funeral directors to keep attendance register for funerals.

5. Eucharist

a. Holy Communion in the hand only.

Friday 24 July 2020

- b. Sacred Host to be offered only, not the Precious Blood.
- c. No touching at the sign of peace.
- d. No offertory procession.
- e. No congregational singing.
- f. No collection plates are to be used, but money/envelopes placed at collection points.

6. Communion to Sick and Elderly

Normal pastoral practice continues including Communion to sick persons in hospitals, aged care homes and private homes.

7. Anointing of the Sick

Normal Pastoral Practice continues.

- a. Anointing of the sick in hospitals, aged care homes and private homes if permitted to enter.
- b. If the person has COVID-19, please consult the Bishop's Office.

8. First Penance & First Holy Communion


Normal Pastoral Practice continues, respecting liturgical and pastoral protocols.

9. Confirmation

The sacrament of Confirmation in the Diocese of Wagga Wagga is to be delayed until term 4. If all is clear at that time, Parish Priests will have delegated authority for Confirmations for this year.





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Family reflections for: 12th July - Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 19th July - Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's Gospel reminds us that in order for God's Word to take root in us and produce abundant fruit, we must endeavor to be like good soil. Families, in particular, hold the responsibility for "preparing the soil" so that the seeds of God's Word can grow strong. There are many ways in which families do this—family traditions in which faith is celebrated, prayer and reading of Scripture, and instruction on the faith. In these ways, parents fulfill the promises they made at their child's

Gather together as a family and reflect together on the Sacrament of Baptism. Tell the story of the Baptism of each child, showing any pictures that were taken. If you have your child's Baptism candle or gown, share these as well. Recall together that one of the promises that parents make at their child's Baptism is to bring them up in the practice of our faith. Talk together about the importance of this promise to your family. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 13:1-23. Reflect together on the ways in which your family practices your faith (daily prayer, Mass attendance, religious instruction, etc.). Remind one another that we do these things as a family so that God's Word can take root in our lives and produce abundant fruit. Conclude in prayer together by praying today's Psalm, Psalm 65.

> Isaiah 55:10-11 Psalm 65:10-14 Romans 8:18-23 Matthew 13:1-23

Taken together, the parables found in today's Gospel offer both a sobering reminder about the Kingdom of God and words of encouragement.

As the wheat and the weeds must grow together until the harvest, so we may not know whether our actions contribute to God's Kingdom until God's final judgment. With this word of caution in mind, we act always in prayer that our actions will be consistent with God's plans. In the parables of the mustard seed and the yeast, we hear words of encouragement. God can bring the Kingdom of Heaven from even the smallest of beginnings. Thus, we ask God to work through us for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Set aside some time this week to make bread with your family. Show the amount of yeast that is required to raise an entire batch of bread. Observe that little things can go a long way. After the bread has been baked, gather together as a family. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 13:24-43. Reflect together on what Jesus means when he teaches that the Kingdom of Heaven is like a mustard seed and like yeast. In these parables, Jesus is teaching us that God can work wonders from even the smallest beginnings of the Kingdom of God. This means that even the little things that we do can make a big difference in the lives of others. What are some of the little things that we can do in our family that help to make things better for others? Decide on one action to take together. Pray that God will use your action to make a difference in the world. Pray together the Lord's Prayer. Wisdom 12:13,16-19 Psalm 86:5-6,9-10,15-16 Romans 8:26-27 Matthew 13:24-43

26th July - Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time,

Like the person who found the buried treasure and the merchant who acquired the pearl of great price, we seek to find the signs of the kingdom of heaven in our lives. In fact, we even work to bring about God's kingdom in our actions and in our words. We pray that our family values reflect our pursuit of the kingdom of heaven. As Jesus' disciples, we place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of

As you gather as a family, talk about what your family values. Make a list together of those things that your family considers most important, such as family, friends, faith, trust, and love. Place this list before you as you read today's Gospel in its shorter form, Matthew 13:44-46. In these parables, Jesus teaches us that it is worth giving up even valuable things in order to possess the kingdom of heaven. Look at the list your family made and talk about how these things are important to the kingdom of heaven. What has your family given up to make these values important in your life? As Jesus' disciples, we place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of God. Pray together for God's kingdom by praying the Lord's Prayer.

WORDS OF THE HOLY FATHER

What is the attitude that the Lord asks us to have, so that the kingdom of God may grow and be bread for everyone and shelter for all?.

The answer is clear: "docility". In fact, the kingdom of God grows, with docility to the strength of the Holy Spirit. The flour ceases to be flour and becomes bread, because it is docile to the strength of the yeast; and again: the yeast is left to mix with the flour. And even though flour does not have sentiments, we know that in allowing it to be "knead", there is "some pain", as there is later when you allow it to cook. The same dynamic is found, regarding the kingdom of God, which grows in this way, and then eventually becomes food for everyone.

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A second chance at Jeevanie

Some come from broken families, others are orphaned. The girls at the Jeevanie boarding house in Colombo have one thing in common; they have no option to return home, and the Jeevanie family has become their own.

The support of our Children's Mission Partners ensures the girls continue to live in a safe, happy and educational environment.

There are 35 children living at the Jeevanie home in Colombo, Sri Lanka's capital city of 750,000 people. They have come from all over the country, all from untenable family situations or abandonment. 'Many of the children come from broken families,' says Sister Shathini Fernando F.M.M, who runs the home. 'For some, their mothers have had to go overseas to earn any money.'

The Jeevanie home welcomes these children with the aim of fulfilling their rights to shelter, education, and food, and doing so with loving care. 'Our primary aim is to give a sound Christian formation to all our children who are under our care,' says Sr Shathini. 'From the beginning, we take every step to develop in them Christian values through their experience in the home, parish and school.'

A sound formal education for each of the girls at the home, who are aged between eight and 18 years, is the priority for the sisters. 'The children are provided with all the facilities to get a formal education,' Sr Shathini says. 'Nineteen of the girls are attending our private school, run by the sisters, while others attend a nearby government school.

'We also provide private tuition for the girls in important subjects such as mathematics, English, Sinhala (the predominant language in Sri Lanka), history, science and music,' Sr Shathini says. 'The children are also trained in dance and computer studies, and many

of them are very interested in sports, so we provide the opportunities to help them develop their skills.'

Achini Fernando is one of the girls living at Jeevanie. Aged 16, Achini has been at the home since she was a very young girl, as her parents are no longer around to care for her. 'Her grandmother is the only one who took care of Achini and her sister, but she is very old and frail, and unable to these days,' says Sr

Achini is a quiet girl, but a

conscientious student who loves music and sports. 'She wants to study well and become a teacher,' Sr Shathini reports. 'She will have a very bright future if she continues to study well. As a teacher, she will serve many more children like her. I hope she will have a happy life.'

The care, love and support provided by the sisters has had a life-changing influence on Achini and the other girls at Jeevanie. Catholic Mission's Children's Mission Partners program covers essentials such as daily meals for the girls, clothing, medication, education costs and supplies, and other important ongoing costs associated with their accommodation.

The girls are very happy and grateful for your support, and Sr Shathini says their future is looking bright. 'These girls are very clever, and they will serve the society with their gifts and talents.'

When Fr Wilfred 'Plunky' Plunkett passed away peacefully on the 7th June 2020, Presentation Sister Carmel Clancy was with him and she shares this reflection on being with him in his final days.

A month ago who would have imagined that I would be sitting alone alongside Fr Wilf Plunkett when he breathed his last breath and went to his God so peacefully.

When Wilf arrived at the Forrest Centre less than a month ago, I invited him to have lunch and dinner in the dining room and he was out like a flash. Soon he was asking where I was at breakfast time however I didn't forfeit my breakfast in bed as easily as that. It was obvious Wilf wasn't well and eating meals was a torture ... he soldiered on.


After bouts of serious pain, he had a night in the Base and came home with a bowl of satin roses given to him by the nurses ... they gave him much comfort. Gradually Wilf went downhill but kept up with his SBS programs on rail travel with Michael Portillo.

His sister, Patricia, aged 86, and her daughter Jane, came from Canberra twice in the last fortnight and stayed

overnight. The contrast in Wilf's attention to them during the space of a week was overwhelming for them. On their first visit he was able to instruct them as to what he wanted from Settlers and in came the two prize paintings to be hung in his room. They did remarkably well getting his treasures. On the second visit Wilf was immobile in bed with no response to the hand rubs or face strokes.

Wilf's nephew, Joan's son from Mossvale, came to visit and that helped greatly. On Saturday, after a further visit to Settlers, Patricia and Jane packed Wilf's treasures and said their good byes and left me to sit with Wilf whom they called Bede. There was no knowing that it would be just over 24 hours before the final call.

I was a bit slow off the mark on Sunday morning however I was pleased to find Wilf was still with us. After lunch I just sat with him and prayed all the underlined verses in my bible thinking we would



have similar favourites. I then just continued to moisten his lips, stroke his brow and pray God take him and he did just that at 4:45pm with no fuss, just two puffs and he slipped away peacefully into the embrace of his God.

After a couple of minutes I went out and informed the staff that I

thought Wilf had died. Just as they were rushing in to see, Fr Kevin O'Reilly arrived so we prayed for Wilf, had a talk and then Fr Kevin left to notify the clergy. I had my tea and went to bed grateful that I had had the privilege of being with such a beautiful priest at such a sacred time.

Fr Plunkett's funeral was held on 19th June 2020. Due to Covid restrictions a funeral cortege was created to ensure all those that wanted to attend could in a very unique way.
